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MEMORANDUM AND ORDER

This complaint of judicial misconduct was filed by [REDACTED] (“complainant”) against [REDACTED] subject judge”), pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 351. The complainant generally asserts the subject judge committed judicial misconduct by failing to address “documented evidence of the criminal misconduct of his superiors” including the Chief Justice of the United States, the United States Attorney General, officials at the Department of Justice, and the former President of the United States, among others.

After conducting an initial review, the chief judge may dismiss a complaint of judicial misconduct as to which he concludes: (A) that the claimed conduct, even if it occurred, “is not prejudicial to the effective and expeditious administration of the business of the courts”; (B) that the complaint “is directly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling”; (C) that the complaint is “frivolous,” a term that applies to charges that are wholly unsupported; or (D) that the complaint “lack[s] sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred.” Rule 11(c)(1)(A)-(D), Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings; see 28 U.S.C. § 352(a), (b).

A review of the record shows complainant’s allegations lack sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct exists and, therefore, are subject to dismissal under Rule 11(c)(1)(D). Additionally, complainant’s allegations are wholly unsupported. The complainant points to no evidence that the subject judge engaged in any judicial misconduct. The record contains no evidence whatsoever to support complainant’s allegations. The complaint is thus subject to dismissal as frivolous under Rule 11(c)(1)(C). See also 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii).

Accordingly, it is **ORDERED** that the complaint be dismissed pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii) and Rule 11(c)(1)(C)-(D) of the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings.
